Kip Price shared the story of Piedmont. WV native. James Aubrey Stewart, and 10 other African-American servicemen who became separated from their unit during the Battle of the Bulge. Also, the presentation featured special guest, World War II veteran, Asa Davison.

Also originally from Piedmont, WV, Mr. Price began his journey sharing the story of the Wereth Eleven through the Aubrey Stewart Project, and has since conducted independent presentations on the lives of these heroes throughout North Central West Virginia area.

The Life & Art of **Justine Hart**

On March 21, the Harrison County WV Historical Society and the Starving Artist Studio cosponsored a presentation on the life and art of local artist, Justina Carskadon Anne Hart, granddaughter of Justina Hart, discussed the art and achievements of her late grandmother.

native Clarksburg Justina Carskadon Hart began painting at age four, and attended the Randolph-Macon Women's College, and was a graduate of the New York School of Fine & Applied Arts (Parsons School of Design). Hart is represented in the collections of many museums and private collections in the U.S. Her work reflects the influence of Hans Hofmann with

whom she studied and under whose tutelage she moved from small objective large, non-objective painting. A contemporary of Blanche Lazzell and James Edward Davis, Hart found that both of these artists to be critical in her development as abstractionist, and she went on to achieve recognition for her inventive collages and paintings. Mrs. Hart had studios in New York City and Palm Beach, Florida at various points in her life, and exhibited onewoman shows at galleries in New York, Nantucket. Massachusetts, Fairmont State University, West Virginia University, Charleston's Sunrise Museum, and locally in Clarksburg. Furthermore, Mrs. Hart was an instructor Salem College and Fairmont State College, and was a founding member and director first of the Clarksburg Art Center.

Remembering the West Milford, Highland, & Two Lick Dams

As the Harrison County community mourns the loss of the West Milford, Highland, and Two Lick Dams, the HCWVHS takes a look back at the early attempt to make the West Fork River navigable.

Our historical sources on this topic come from Dorothy Davis' article, "An Attempt to Improve Navigation on the West Fork River," and Henry Haymond's History of Harrison County: From the

Early Days of Northwestern Virginia to the Present. On January 19, 1817, an act of Virginia Legislature incorporated the Monongahela Navigation Company for the purpose of improving commercial navigation on the West Fork and Monongahela Rivers. The company would be responsible for constructing a series of locks, dams, and slopes to expand vear-round boat traffic from Stone Coal Creek to the West Fork and Monongahela right up into Pennsylvania.

Local Harrison County citizens, John George Jackson, Benjamin Wilson, Jr., James Pindall, George Davisson, William Williams, John Ralph Berkshire, Stealey, Felix Scott, Thomas Wilson, John Rogers, and George S. Daring, were authorized to receive subscriptions for stock in the Monongahela Navigation Company which amounted to \$100 share. However, when the company charged John Jackson George with assembling seven dams on the West Fork in 1822, Jackson's old rivalry with Benjamin Wilson reignited. Dorothy Davis recounted this incident in her article:

"Those in the northern portion of the county who opposed the work of the company-people in Bridgeport and Shinnston areassent petitions in December 1822... the petitioners (Benjamin Wilson, Jr., was the first name signed to the petition from Bridgeport) feared the passage of fish would be impeded by the dams, stagnant ponds created would be a menace to the health of the citizens, and water in the stream during twelve months of the year would prevent 'the procuring of Stone Coal and Iron Ore out of the bed of the river." (7)

Despite petitions, work continued and dams were built at Lambert's Run, Tenmile Creek. Shinnston, and White Rocks by 1824. Approximately \$18,918 was spent on the completion of the dams (Davis, 8).

However, this success was short lived. Two major setbacks lead to the demise of the Monongahela Navigation Company and its dams. High waters and floods during 1822-1824 prevented the completion of all seven dams and damaged the existing ones. Then, the death of the company's principal shareholder, John George Jackson, in 1825 effectively

sealed the fate of the company. Without Jackson's influence and money, the company went into confusion and neglected the dams already in place. By 1829, the dams constructed by Navigation Monongahela Company "were declared a common nuisance and the sheriff ordered to abate them" (Davis, 9).

In Memorial

In 2015, the **HCWVHS** three lost important members from our organization. Robert Haymond Maxwell, Jr., Jack Sandy Anderson, Beatrice D. Quigley were promoters supporters of local history and our organization. All led exciting lives and will be sadly missed by those whose lives they touched.



Robert Haymond Maxwell, Jr. 1943-2015

Robert Maxwell was a seeker of new ways to tell stories. Born in Clarksburg, WV, he was the son of Haymond Maxwell, Jr. and Jane Linn Maxwell Roger. Robert was a proud graduate of Washington Irving High School; studied cinematography broadcasting at University of Southern California and was a graduate of the University of Hard Knocks in WV, from WV new's journalist, Jim Comstock.

Robert's WI pals, Swiger, Robert N. Gary Mimi Dawson, and Fleming, [WI '61] remember his love of music, especially participation in the garage band, "The Electras". Robert and his friends were infamous for creating a sophomore prom in the old Waldo Hotel and renting the old VFW hall for a fund raiser. Robert N. Swiger noted that those close bonds with so many school mates reflected their mutual respect during their journey through formative years and after (*WI High School Newsletter website).

Robert's travels across the country would take him to Indiana, New York City, Washington, D.C., Pittsburgh, and finally back home to Clarksburg, WV. He won awards, worked with some of the best news' journalists and with the best news' shows: The Today Show, Huntley Brinkley, Hullaboloo, and AFL Football. His political film work was featured on "60 Minutes"; his music productions were on PBS "All Radio, Thngs Considered". He was a gifted still photographer, musician, storyteller in film and word.

Robert Maxwell was a member of the Harrison County Historical Society and Oral Lake Fishing Club. He is survived by his sister, Mary Linn Maxwell of Clarksburg.



Jack Sandy Anderson 1932-2015

Jack Sandy Anderson left his home in West Virginia to go Beyond to share his stories. Jack had done all he could for Harrison and Marion Counties, Shinnston and his home state to save their histories. He had listened to others tell stories when he was young, especially his grandmother, Cora Martin Sandy. He went on to enlighten hundreds of young people for 31 years as a teacher; worked to start historical society's in Harrison and Marion Counties; collect as many photos, pieces of pottery, glass, post cards, diaries, letters, furniture, and "you name it" if it had something to do with beauty and history. He told stories and others listened. Tell Jack your name, upon being introduced, and he'd tell you if you were related to

him, or where your lineage began, who married who, how many children and where they lived. He was a living "green leaf" of "Ancestry.com". If you were part of his ancestry line, he would recite that line. He knew more about those early individuals than most did.

Jack wrote many books including six on cooking. He collaborated with many other historians. He was a friend and mentor. He wrote about our communities and people we know of. Among them, "Ramblings" was about Shinnston; "Out Of The Past" centered on Harrison County. On Tuesday, June 21st, 2015, 2 weeks before his passing, Jack worked with a member of Harrison County Historical Society to complete the editing of his last book of articles, Glimpses of the Past: Marion History County Vignettes.

Who will tell the stories, Jack, now that your memories are gone?

Jack Sandy Anderson was preceded in death by his parents, Russell Lowell Anderson and Pearle Sandy Anderson, step-brothers and 1 stepsister. He is survived by sister, Patricia (Patty) Sampson, many nieces and nephews and his beloved dog, "Big Boy".

To tell ALL of Jack's story and of his accomplishments would be an enormous undertaking. Instead, it is an honor for HCWVHS to preserve his stories.



Beatrice D. Quigley 1919-2015

Beatrice Quigley, known to her friends as "Bea", grew up in Clarksburg, WV. Her giving spirit and devotion to civic work have become part of her legacy to Harrison County. She would tell of memories of the 1924 presidential candidate. Clarksburg's own John W. Davis, and of hearing him speak in his very public presidential visit back to Clarksburg. Bea was a graduate from Washington Irving HS in 1937, where she

lettered in basketball; went on to Salem College, and then would go to Washington, D.C. to train with the first class of 12 young women (from 1000 applicants) in the first class of airline hostesses for the Pennsylvania Central Airlines. Following World War II, she returned to Clarksburg, completed her Bachelor of Arts Degree from Salem College, and would eventually become the Chief of Library Services at the Veterans' Hospital in Clarksburg. She retired in

To tell the story of Bea's unlimited civic energies is impossible: Clarksburg Junior Women's Club, Altrusa International, NARFE, Friends of Fort New Salem, active with the Governor Johnson Garden Club, and still had time to enjoy a round of golf as a long-time member of the Sunnycroft Country Club. Bea's service with the Bridgeport United Methodist Church was one of longstanding devotion in so many ways.

The Harrison County WV Historical Society is proud to say that "Bea" Quigley was one of the founding members of our Historical Society. Her many hours of patronage and volunteer contributions are honored as part of our history in this county.

Our financial report shows a large donation amount which reflects the generosity of a few individuals who have contributed greatly to cover the match required from the State Historic Preservation Office. This grant will enable us to raise the addition on the back side of the house and place a foundation under it. This will stabilize the building which has separated. Additionally, donations have allowed the society to begin our digital catalog of our collection. Aside from utilities and insurance, most expenses reflect costs of archival material and office equipment, programming and costs of books/printing.

The coming year will see the society pay \$18,000 toward our share of the house repair and \$4,000 for another year of an Americarp Member if granted. The steps and porch are in need of stabilization so they will be safe for people entering the building. We have submitted a grant for that work. This will require additional fundraising. The estimate for that work is \$28,700. Now is the time to make repairs for the future. Anyone wishing to help in our effort is welcome.

Thanks go out to our community for 1,160 volunteer hours worth \$22,040 at the rate of \$19 an hour. We received in-kind donations of \$6,520.36. The value of our rental space in the Olymbec building is estimated at \$21,600. This is a value of \$28,560.35, and when added to cash donations, is a total value of \$54,445.35. **Thanks to everyone!** More to come.
